## Bulletin 54: CONSTRUCTION (DESIGN & MANAGEMENT) REGULATIONS 2015

## The Construction (Design & Management) Regulations 2015

These replace the 2007 CDM Regulations, and apply to any construction (or major repair) project that involves more than one contractor.

In brief, the church as client has a legal responsibility for health & safety on site and must appoint a competent "principal designer" (such as an architect or surveyor) to manage these issues during the pre-construction phase of a building project, and a competent "principal contractor" to do so during the works.

Major projects (lasting longer than 30 working days with more than 20 workers on site at the same time) must be notified to the Health & Safety Executive.
