ARC Rural Ministry Course

Tuesday 14 – Thursday 16 June (Midlands) King's Park Conference Centre, Northampton

The Rural Ministry Course is designed for **lay and ordained church leaders across the denominations entering a rural appointment for the first time**, and those already **in rural ministry who feel the need for a 'refresher'**.

The three-day programme employs a variety of approaches including practical sessions, group work and workshops led by practitioners, and includes sessions on understanding rural contexts, mission and growth, leadership, farming and work with children and young people in the countryside.

Keeping shop

Rural consumers name their village shop as their most essential service. The Association of Convenience Stores has published its <u>Rural Shop Report 2022</u>, with profiles of the entrepreneurs who provide vital rural services.

ARC partner Plunkett is lobbying wholesaler Booker, after it told independent retailers they will be charged a flat £34.95 delivery fee on all orders. This will come as a further blow for many community-owned shops, who already face challenges securing the delivery of core goods through major wholesalers.

Support network created for Rural Pioneers

A network for Church Mission Society rural pioneers is set to gather for the first time. The CMS aims to connect missioners working rurally to pray and support each other across the UK. The Pioneering in Rural Communities conference will take place on May 14, at the Church of St Nicholas in Corfe Mullen, Dorset. Convenor Peter Jones said: "All rural pioneers can join this adventure so we can journey together to grow hope in our communities. The network will offer a home and a place to belong for the pioneer in the rural context."

Back To Northern Synod. What Is Happening in Your Community?

Have the recent storms created problems in your community? We have all seen images of snow, floods, fallen trees, damaged property and downed power lines. It is difficult for people to understand the scale of the suffering experienced when they have been fortunate enough to avoid it themselves. Not being content just to sit back and complain at the lack information from the County Council I drafted a series of five comprehensive bus timetable leaflets for our area and persuaded the group to print and distribute them. We were able to get funding from Rotary and Dalesbus to cover the print cost of just under £400. In trying outlets for them in each community I was amazed to discover how many places do not have a shop of any sort. Some didn't even have a public house. Village hall or church. There was nowhere for the community to meet. How will our rural communities survive without even basic amenities? Yes, we can do almost everything by internet but we are human and sometimes we just need to meet another human being in person.
